100 Years of Blue Slip Policies and Practices

- The blue slip is not a formal Senate rule. Rather, it is a courtesy extended by the committee chairman that has evolved over its 100-year history.
- Over the life of the blue slip, only two chairmen had policies preventing consideration of nominees based on a negative or unreturned blue slip. Sixteen other chairmen would either allow consideration or did not have a policy with regard to blue slips.
- Senate Democrats unilaterally changed the rules in 2013 to prevent 41 senators from blocking nominees after evaluating their credentials. Now that the Democrats are in the minority, they want to allow a single senator to block nominees before the Committee can even evaluate them.

*Chairman Leahy's blue slip policy not only allowed home-state senators to block committee consideration of nominees via the blue slip, but he also allowed the Democratic senators from Michigan to block consideration of two Ohio-based circuit nominees even though the Ohio senators returned postive blue slips.

"'Advice and consent' was never envisioned as a check that involved a minority of the Senate being able to block a presidential [nomination]." -Sen. Jeff Merkley (D-Ore.)

"More often than not, however, [the blue slip] is and will be used to stop nominees for political or other reasons having nothing to do with qualifications." -Sen. Dianne Feinstein (D-Calif.)

The blue slip should not be "abused simply to delay [the Committee's] ability to make progress filling vacancies."
