Dear Administrator Strickling:

On February 14, 2012, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) stated that it would move to revoke a waiver received by satellite company LightSquared to build a terrestrial telecommunications network. The FCC's statement cited tests coordinated by the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) which showed that LightSquared's network could not co-exist and would cause "harmful interference to many GPS receivers."<sup>1</sup>

This decision capped a long and winding process which saw the Federal government conduct an extensive amount of testing in order to aid LightSquared's planned business model. In fact, Deputy Secretary of Transportation John Porcari testified before Congress that the Federal Aviation Administration alone spent \$2 million and that it was "quite unusual" for the Federal government to spend so much money to assist a single private company.<sup>2</sup> You also noted, in a letter to FCC Chairman Genachowski, that "federal agencies...have invested significant time and resources to identify and analyze proposed solutions to address the impact of LightSquared's planned network implementations."<sup>3</sup> It is our understanding that despite the extensive Federal funds spent evaluating and testing LightSquared's proposed network, the Federal government has not recouped much of the costs expended.

Currently, LightSquared's financial future has been the subject of much speculation. LightSquared recently laid-off 149 employees, 45% of its total workforce.<sup>4</sup> Harbinger Capital Partners, LightSquared's parent company has taken out a \$190 million loan at a 15% interest rate, close to three times the rate charged to the riskiest corporate borrowers.<sup>5</sup> And, LightSquared has missed a \$56.25 million payment to satellite company Inmarsat.<sup>6</sup>

Despite initial company denials, LightSquared has now reversed course and is "seriously considering" bankruptcy.<sup>7</sup> If LightSquared does indeed declare bankruptcy, our concern is that the Federal government will be unable to recoup the taxpayer dollars it has expended funding testing on LightSquared's network.

- 4. Has the FCC ever requested the NTIA to provide government resources without reimbursement to assist a single private company with its business plans?
  - a. If so, please list examples.
  - b. If not, please explain why not.
