Dear Chairman Grassley:

Thank you for your letter of April 8, 2026, and for your continued focus on the critical issue of protecting children from online exploitation. At xAI, protecting people—particularly children—from harm is a lodestar that guides us on our mission to understand the universe.

xAI has zero tolerance for child sexual exploitation, and we are determined to make our products inhospitable for actors who seek to exploit minors. We are committed to our obligations under 18 U.S.C. § 2258A, and to constructive engagement with the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC), law enforcement, and Congress to support efforts that safeguard minors.

xAI submitted over 135,000 reports to the NCMEC CyberTipline in 2025, and has already submitted over 127,000 in 2026. As this volume has increased, so has xAI's collaboration with NCMEC. Indeed, xAI is engaged in a continuous, collaborative feedback loop with NCMEC, and incorporates their recommendations into both our internal tools and reporting processes to ensure our submissions are as effective and useful as possible for law enforcement.

As an example, in late 2025, xAI received feedback from NCMEC that its reports were lacking certain details that would increase their utility to law enforcement in their pursuit of criminal actors. xAI promptly arranged a live meeting with NCMEC to better understand their suggestions, and—by January 10, 2026—had resubmitted reports for 28,255 users with more complete information. xAI also rebuilt its tooling pipelines to include the requested information, such that every report submitted in 2026 contains the enhanced dataset. This dataset includes names, email addresses, and phone numbers where available. xAI has also enhanced its reports to include IP addresses and session data associated with reported users to enable geolocation. Consistent with the REPORT Act, xAI preserves this data for 12 months and works with law enforcement in identifying and prosecuting users pursuant to appropriate legal process.

xAI continues to prioritize the refinement of our child-safety measures. This includes sustained investments in technology to better detect and prevent potential misuse of our AI systems, proactive monitoring of public interactions

with Grok, and efforts to strengthen the overall quality and completeness of our reporting to NCMEC.

xAI appreciates the opportunity to provide this information in response to the Committee's letter. We remain dedicated to these important issues and welcome continued dialogue on the responsible development and deployment of AI technologies that advance public safety.
